One Voice Wales and "It's for them" Campaign

Regularly cut, closely mown grass may look tidy, but it has little benefit for wildlife. Reducing mowing on road verges and amenity grasslands will allow grasses and wildflowers to grow. This creates a better habitat for 'Them': invertebrates, birds, small mammals, amphibians, and reptiles. Welsh Government's 'It's for Them' campaign aims to increase the awareness of the public of the benefits of mowing less and enhancing biodiversity.

Local places for nature: Powys Nature Partnership

Over the next two years, Powys County Council, in partnership with Bannau Brycheiniog National Park Authority (where appropriate), will support community and town councils with funding for projects that meet these goals. These grants could support a council's Biodiversity Action Plans and help to fulfil their statutory requirement under Section 6 of the Environment Act 2016. Any actions taken should be included

in your next Section 6 report, due in 2025. Community and town councils will be encouraged to work towards the Welsh Government campaigns, 'It's For Them' and 'Bee Friendly'.

Applications between £500 and £5000 will be considered in this round of funding. Applications from two or more councils will be eligible for up to £10,000 for larger costs of machinery. Funding must be spent within the 2023/24 financial year. This can be preparatory spent for changes to the mowing practices in 2024.

- Look for opportunities to be less neat and tidy. Well-kept hedgerows and gardens provide little support to wildlife. Can you create any <u>wild areas in your garden</u>?
- Record the wildlife you see. We rely on voluntary wildlife recorders submitting their records (also known as wildlife sightings) to the <u>Biodiversity Information Service for Powys and the Brecon</u> <u>Beacons</u> (BIS). These records tell us about the changes in wildlife populations and areas where conservation efforts are required. Records are also used locally to inform planning applications and can highlight the wildlife importance of a site. BIS also run <u>training events</u> to help improve your wildlife identification skills.
- Join in with citizen science surveys or projects. Much like recording, these provide conservationists with much-needed wildlife records. You can join in with surveys ran by conservation organisations, which provide you with all the information you need to get started with identifying and recording wildlife.
- Look for opportunities to help to improve local greenspaces for wildlife. This could include litter picking, putting up bird boxes, creating dead wood piles or assisting with habitat management, such as creating and managing wildflower areas. You can also volunteer with community wildlife groups and conservation charities to support local conservation projects.
- Become a Bee-Friendly Community by taking part in <u>Welsh Government's Bee Friendly initiative</u>.
- Help the hedgehogs in your area by working as a community to create <u>hedgehog highways</u>.

Home Improvement Loans

Funded via Welsh Government, the purpose of the scheme is to provide short to medium term loans to help homeowners improve the condition of their residential property. Loans of up to £5,000 per unit of accommodation can be considered to fund the cost of works necessary to make your home 'secure, safe and warm', such as replacing a roof. All loans will be zero interest however a small fee will be added to cover administrative costs. It will also be necessary to pass an affordability assessment to ensure that applicants are able to afford the repayments.
